Have you visited with Riley the Therapy Dog? Riley comes every Wednesday at 10:30, so if you'd like to see him be sure and come to the Great Room!



## Local History: Luther Burbank

On Jan. 27, 1900, The Press Democrat reported that Luther Burbank began experiments to produce a new sugar cane that was smaller in size but had a higher sugar content for Hawaiian planters. Burbank also experimented with new varieties of coffee, and reported that coffee plants he had recently propagated were now "two inches above the ground."

Luther Burbank was born March 7, 1849 in Lancaster, Massachusetts. Burbank was an American plant breeder whose prodigious production of useful varieties of fruits, flowers, vegetables, and grasses encouraged the development of plant breeding into a modern science.

Reared on a farm, Burbank received little more than a high school education, but he was profoundly influenced by the books of Charles Darwin, especially The Variation of Animals and Plants Under Domestication (1868). At the age of 21 he purchased a 7-hectare (17-acre) tract near Lunenberg, Massachusetts, and began a 55-year plant-breeding career that almost immediately saw the development of the Burbank, or Idaho, potato.

Selling the rights to the potato for \$150 to use as travel fare to California, he settled in Santa Rosa in 1890. Burbank moved to California in 1875, and settled in Santa Rosa, and saved money to buy land for a nursery. In a few years, he owned a prosperous business. Not interested in business, he sold his nursery

in 1893, and set up an experimental farm in nearby Sebastopol, California. His home in Santa Rosa had many rare trees, shrubs, and flowers., where he established a nursery garden, a greenhouse, and experimental farms that were to become famous throughout the world. In his fifty-five year career Burbank developed more than 800 new strains and varieties of plants, including 113 varieties of plums, 20 of which are still commercially sold, especially in California



and South Africa; 10 commercial varieties of berries; and more than 50 varieties of lilies.

In October of 1915 Burbank had some special guests come to his Santa Rosa home. It was like winning the Sweepstakes, or maybe better – Luther Burbank was being asked if he would like to hang out with the most famous man in the world. "We would appreciate it very much if you would consent to head a Committee to go to Sacramento, to greet Mr. Edison and escort him to San Francisco," the letter read. "We believe that nothing could be more fitting than that the Wizard of the West should extend welcome and greeting to the Wizard of the East on his visit to California." Burbank was to escort Edison to the Panama-Pacific International Exposition. Burbank had a special day named after him at the Exposition. Edison arrived in San Francisco after four days, one of which was to pick up Henry Ford who decided to tag along to boost his popularity. After the exposition the Press Democrat caught wind that Ford and Edison would be joining Burbank at his Santa Rosa home.

With only three days to prepare, some things slipped through the cracks. Sebastopol grammar school children were told only that morning that class was dismissed for the day and they were going to Santa Rosa to join children from the three grammar schools there in seeing the celebrities. A scramble ensued as kids phoned home to get permission and presumably some cash, as they had to pay their own fares for the electric train. In the end 107 from Sebastopol made the trip. The train arrived to find thousands lining Fourth street from the train depot to the courthouse. Burbank and the Chamber president greeted them, as everyone piled into borrowed cars for a quick spin around town.

Burbank gave his guests a tour of the garden, showing off his new tomato and the cactus beds along with whatever else was still noteworthy that late in the year. Then there were more movies and photographs taken. "Everybody agreed they were mighty good to those picture folk," snarked the PD.





The trio arrived at Burbank's home on Tupper street where they found still more crowds as well as movie cameramen. The three of them posed (for the photograph to the right)and walked to and from the house several times. The party went inside and chatted for about an hour until the children arrived at 3. Only the youngest were allowed inside the gate – they were "Mr. Burbank's pets," Mrs. Edison told her husband. The three men stood on the second floor veranda so everyone could see them. The children were "enthused greatly," according to



the Press Democrat, and began singing loudly, the California state song. The nearly-deaf Edison couldn't make out the words until his wife told him "They're singing, 'I Love You, California.'" He replied, "Are they? God bless them all."

Luther Burbank lived out the rest of his life in his Santa Rosa home with his wife. He wrote numerous books as well as creating numerous varieties of plant life.

Burbank died in 1926 at the age of 77. In accordance with his wishes, his grave is unmarked. He was buried under a Cedar of Lebanon tree which he planted in front of his Santa Rosa cottage in 1893. The Cedar stood as a beloved landmark until its removal due to root disease in 1989. Prior to his death, botanists were not allowed to hold patents for the plant varieties that they helped to create. On June 17, 1930, federal law changed to allow the patenting of new varieties of plants. The Plant Patent Act of 1930 Is created to protect the work of horticulturalists throughout the country, but there was one person on everyone's mind as the inspiration for the new law — Luther Burbank. He was posthumously awarded sixteen patents for some of his many plant varieties. A decade later, the U.S. Postal Service issued a 3-cent stamp honoring Burbank.


